

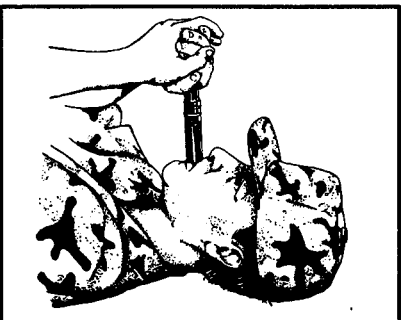
Instructions

1. Place the call in the hand that feels most comfortable to you. Hold the bottom 1/4 of the rubber tip in the "V" between your thumb and forefinger. Slightly wrap your thumb and forefinger around the rubber tip while curving your other fingers to match the curve of your forefinger (as shown in drawing A).
2. Using your other hand, place thumbs together and wrap your fingers around the hand holding the call. (as shown in drawing A). This will form a hollow air chamber at the end of the call which will help restrict the air flow out the other end (as shown in drawing B). Do not totally block off air flow. Let enough air pass between cupped fingers to produce desired tone.
3. Press lips tightly against the large hole and blow very hard using your diaphragm muscles, not your cheeks.
4. The sound of the Barred Owl is created by blowing twice with the rhythm of "who cooks for you" and immediately following with the rhythm of "who cooks for you all."
5. If the sound is too deep, high, soft or loud, experiment by loosening or tightening your cupped hand, or adjust the rubber tip by twisting and sliding it until you reach your desired tone.

Helpful Tip

Unlike wooden calls, the H.S. Strut will not warp from moisture. Always store away from intense heat.

The Ultimate "Gobbler Aggravator" Locator

The H.S. STRUT "Barred" Owl Hooter is unmatched for locating "gobblers" during spring. It consistently delivers loud, exceptionally true tones because of its modern design and materials.

To locate wild turkeys, begin by making soft "gobbler aggravating" calls while positioned on the fringe of your hunting area (hills and higher elevations are best for hearing). Increase volume, if necessary. After getting a response, circle into the general location of the bird. Repeat calls for exact position. For best game-getting results, use H.S. STRUT slate or box calls to bring bird near to range. Use H.S. STRUT diaphragm calls to draw bird in close.
