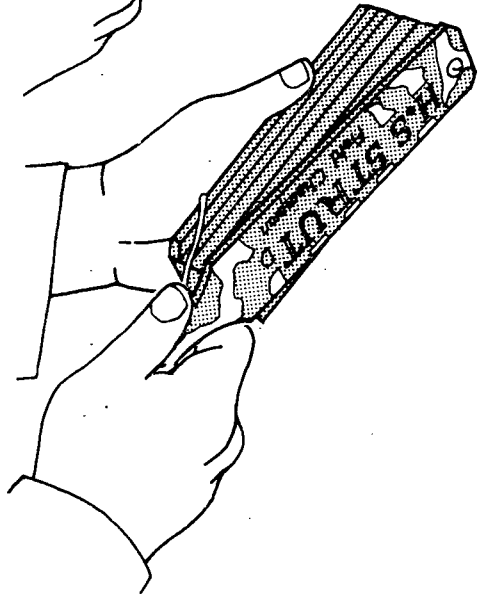

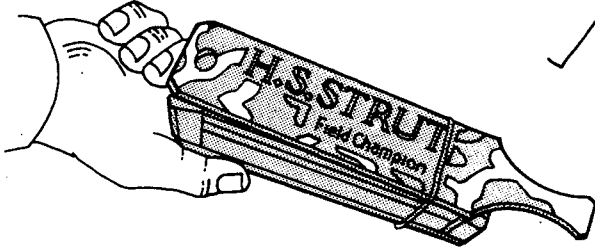

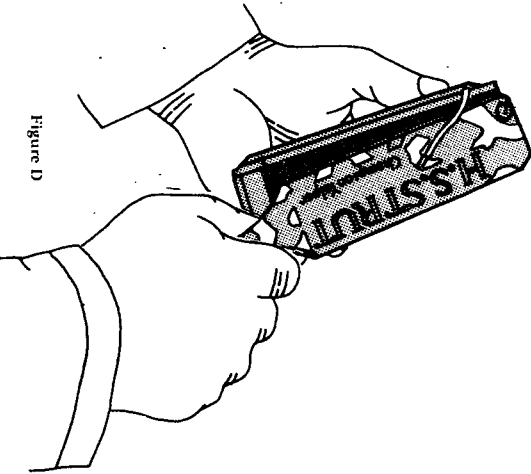

"Field Champion" Instructions

1. HEN CALLS—Figure A—Hold base of call firmly with your left hand as shown. Paddle should be facing toward you. Grip the paddle with your thumb and index finger. Move the paddle across the right calling surface in smooth, even strokes. Do not lift paddle from calling surface!
2. TOM CALLS—Figure B—Same as above instructions except you stroke the left calling surface as shown.
3. GOBBLE—Figure C—Holding base of call firmly with right hand, handle facing away from you, shake call vigorously so that paddle "runs" across Hen and Tom calling surface as shown. USE WITH EXTREME CAUTION AND SOUND JUDGEMENT.

"Champion Yelper" Instructions

1. Figure D—Hold base of call firmly with your left hand as shown.
2. Grip paddle handle lightly with index finger and thumb.
3. Move paddle lid back and forth across the calling surface of the box. Do not lift paddle from calling surface.

Helpful Tips

- All calling surfaces should be kept free of debris and moisture. Avoid touching any friction surface directly with your fingers.
- Paddle should be kept well chalked. To do this, gently rub chalk across the paddle's calling surface, then blow off the excess.
- When hunting in the rain, use your call tucked in a plastic bag; the wood calling surface can be adversely affected by moisture. Heat may also damage the wood calling surface, so never allow the call to sit in direct sunlight for extended periods.
- Rubber bands should be replaced at

the first signs of wear, damage or loss of elasticity. Be certain to use bands of similar size.

- Practice indoors as well as outdoors; the tones will vary.

H.S. STRUT Wild Turkey Talk

Gobble (For "Field Champion" only.) Excellent in spring or fall for bringing "toms" close to range. To reproduce: hold base of call firmly with right hand and shake so that paddle "runs" across gobbler then hen calling surface. USE WITH CAUTION AND SOUND JUDGEMENT.

Assembly Call (Yelp) A hen call used to bring turkeys into hunting area. To reproduce: begin with paddle an inch or two away from calling surface. Using proper rhythm, evenly pull paddle back and forth across calling surface. Start slowly and softly, gradually increasing loudness and intensity.

Whine Soft feeding call useful as an additional call to attract in wary birds. To reproduce: slowly make one long stroke across calling surface. Should be used in conjunction with yelp.

Cackle Hen talk best used during spring to excite response from "tom." To reproduce: start with paddle an inch or two away from calling surface; then make 5 to 7 quick 1/4" strokes, finally into 3 to 5 long yelps.

Cluck Close range hen talk that's soft and shows contentment. To reproduce: very softly make 1/4" strokes starting from yelping position.

Tree Calls Soft, close range early morning normal turkey talk. To reproduce: delicately make 2-3 extremely soft yelps.
